Indigenizing (Mi'kmaq-izing) the Edges: Restoring relational mobilities with Mother Earth

Usually geographical terms like 'Edges' or 'Boundaries' conjure up conceptions of spatial limitations associated with confined spaces, private property, ownership, and segregation and exclusion — all indicative of the dispossession of Indigenous relations for capitalist ones, whereby life beyond humans and the natural ecologies in which they are rooted, become commodities. This talk seeks to take up this year's CAG theme: "edges" in an interest of not only pushing boundaries, but also transforming them through the interaction of multiple perspectives with Indigenous scholarship or worldviews at their center. Through this talk we will explore Anishinaabe, John Borrows' concept of relational mobilities (the intellectual as well as physical) and freedom from an Indigenous perspective as holding potential to reimagine and transform boundaries into relational mobilities as spaces for Wit-lukutimk Wskitqamu (working together, not over, with Earth).

Landscapes on the Edge (Paysages à la Limite)

Many landscapes are on the edge literally, particularly here on the Atlantic Coast of Canada. But landscapes everywhere are on the edge metaphorically: on the edge of change. Tackling the collective challenges we face, and redefining a 'good life' in these new circumstances, will likely transform the places and landscapes that we care about. Yet change is hard and it is felt unevenly across space and social strata. We often instinctively feel that the landscapes of the present should dominate the future—an idea I've been calling climax thinking—but in many cases those current landscape settings solve old problems and cause new ones. Drawing on recent empirical Atlantic research about renewable energy and coastal adaptation, this lecture explores some of the cultural shifts required to reimagine our landscapes and to meet the challenges ahead, identifying key roles for geographers along the way.

Fabian O'Dea Map Collection

In 2005, the Centre for Newfoundland Studies received a donation of 99 maps and charts of early Newfoundland and Labrador. The donor, Dr. Fabian O'Dea, had passed away the previous year. He was a well know public figure, former naval officer, one-time French consul, businessman, barrister, former lieutenant-governor (1963-69), honorary colonel of the Royal Newfoundland Regiment, art connoisseur, and scholar.

He started collecting maps of his home island of Newfoundland while serving in WWII. While on his leaves in Britain, he would visit shops and purchase maps and charts that caught his interest.

Throughout his life, in between the many careers he had, he would find time to not only collect his treasures, but study them and he published numerous articles over the years dealing with cartographic and toponymic history, as well as give presentations.

During the Canadian Association of Geographers Conference, a number of the O'Dea maps and charts will be on display in the Map Room in the QE II Library. Please drop in and enjoy these fascinating and wonderful documents on the early cartography of Newfoundland and Labrador.





Collection de cartes Fabian O'Dea

En 2005, le Centre d'études de Terre-Neuve a reçu un don de 99 cartes et graphiques représentant les débuts de Terre-Neuve-et-Labrador. Le donateur, le Dr. Fabian O'Dea, était décédé l'année précédente. Il était une figure publique bien connue, ancien officier de marine, consul de France, homme d'affaires, avocat, ancien lieutenant-gouverneur (1963-1969), colonel honoraire du Régiment royal de Terre-Neuve, connaisseur d'art et érudit.

Il a commencé à collectionner des cartes de son île natale, Terre-Neuve, alors qu'il servait pendant la Seconde Guerre mondiale. Lors de ses permissions en Grande-Bretagne, il visitait des magasins et achetait des cartes et des graphiques qui attiraient son attention. Tout au long de sa vue, entre les nombreuses carrières qu'il a eues, il trouvait le temps non seulement de collectionner ses trésors, mais aussi de les étudier. Il a publié de nombreux articles au fil des années sur l'histoire cartographique et toponymique, et a donné des conférences.

Pendant la conférence de l'Association canadienne des géographes, un certain nombre de cartes et graphiques de la collection O'Dea seront exposés dans la salle des cartes de la bibliothèque QE II. 

Geographers must grapple with how to train a next generation of scholars while taking seriously our responsibilities to dismantle these systems. In a Canadian context this must include attention to UNDRIP and the TRC Calls to Action as concrete responses to settler colonialism, along with consideration for the ongoing marginalization and sidelining of all 'othered' peoples and epistemologies. Put simply: while we may not have a 'canon', neither do we have an inclusive discipline. At the same time, our graduate programs face other inter-related challenges: a continuously shrinking academic job market for PhD students in a neoliberalized sector; declining funding and



increasing pressures to 'publish and get out'; and increasing prevalence of mental health challenges, among others. This panel aims to reflect on what we are doing (or not doing) to confront these challenges in our graduate teaching and training, and what we could and should do better or differently. It encourages frank and pragmatic reflections from diverse perspectives on the discipline. How are we — and how should we be — training the next generation of geographic knowledge producers?



Landscapes on the Edge (Paysages à la Limite)

Many landscapes are on the edge literally, particularly here on the Atlantic Coast of Canada. But landscapes everywhere are on the edge metaphorically: on the edge of change. Tackling the collective challenges we face, and redefining a 'good life' in these new circumstances, will likely transform the places and landscapes that we care about. Yet change is hard and it is felt unevenly across space and social strata. We often instinctively feel that the landscapes of the present should dominate the future—an idea I've been calling climax thinking—but in many cases those current landscape settings solve old problems and cause new ones. Drawing on recent empirical Atlantic research about renewable energy and coastal adaptation, this lecture explores some of the cultural shifts required to reimagine our landscapes and to meet the challenges ahead, identifying key roles for geographers along the way.





Gabriela Vieyra, Melanie Zurba health concerns are disproportionately vulnerable. Meanwhile, viable climate solutions will require insights from those historically pushed to the edges - and at greatest risk from climate change - if we are to collaboratively create the most effective and equitable options.

However, climate decision-making is hindered and undermined when we ignore emotions' influence on our capacity to identify climate solutions. The human rationality myth – that emotion-free decisions are possible – persists, limiting our ability to recognize emotional nuance and impacts on our beliefs and choices.


